



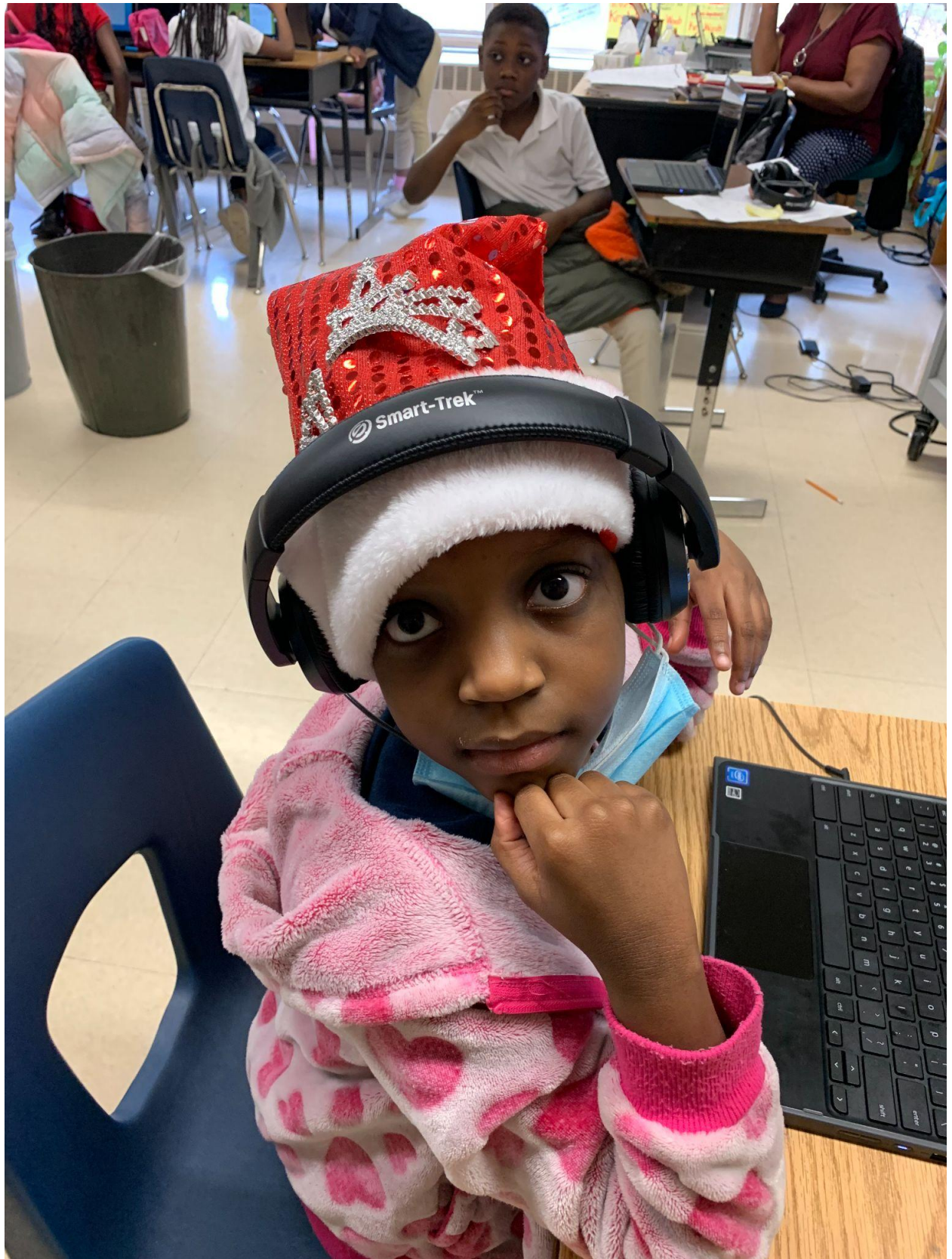


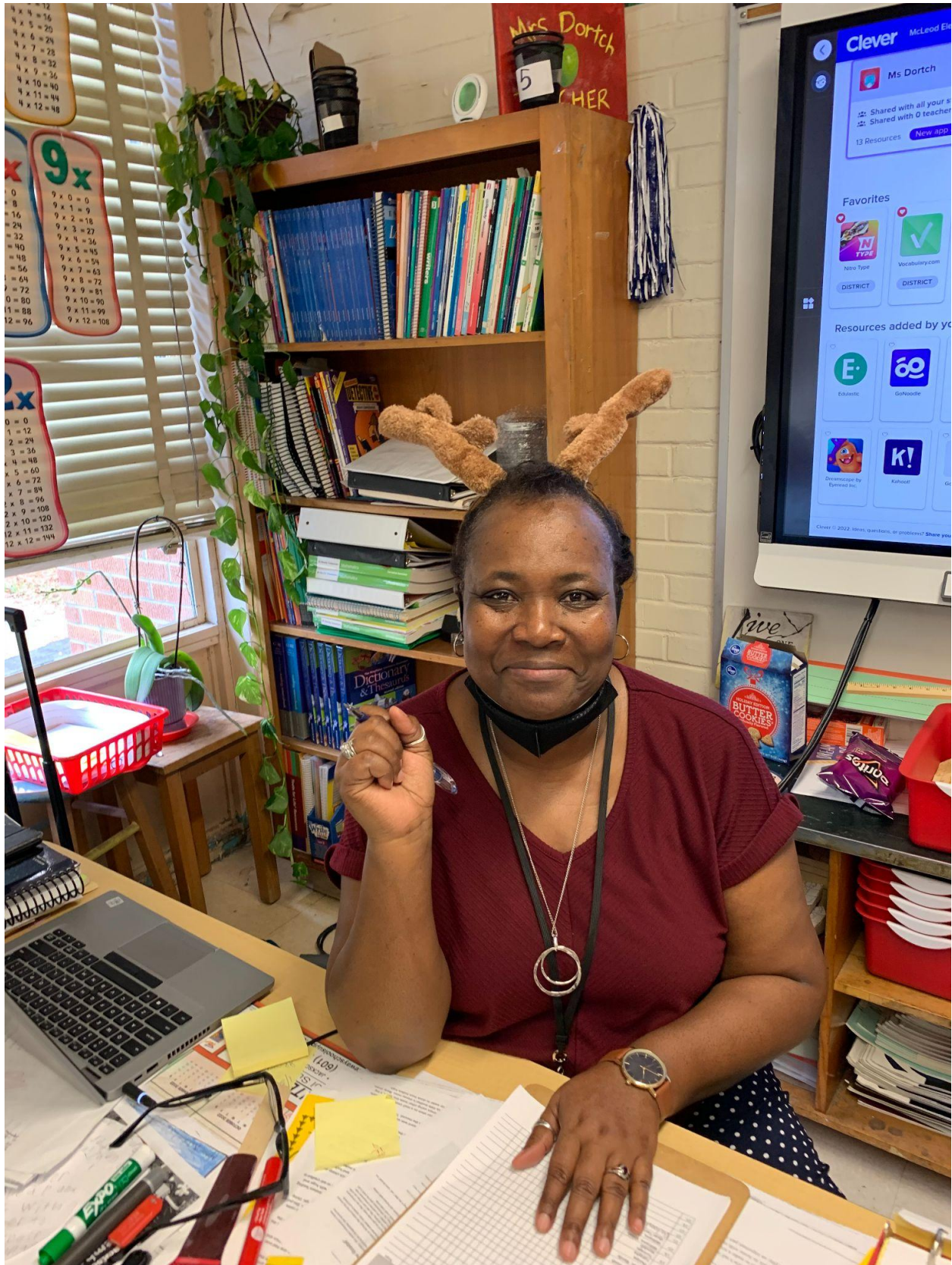




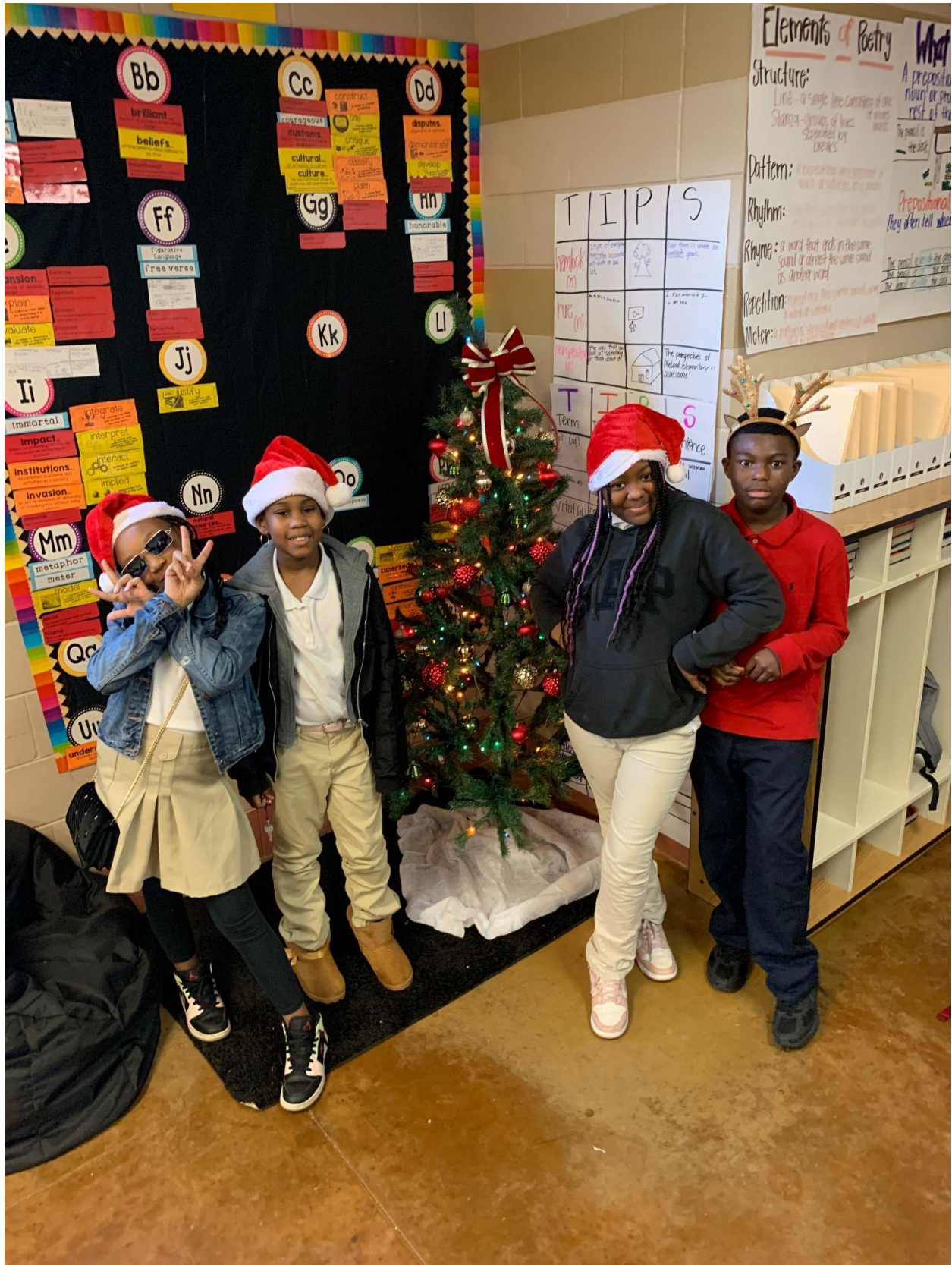


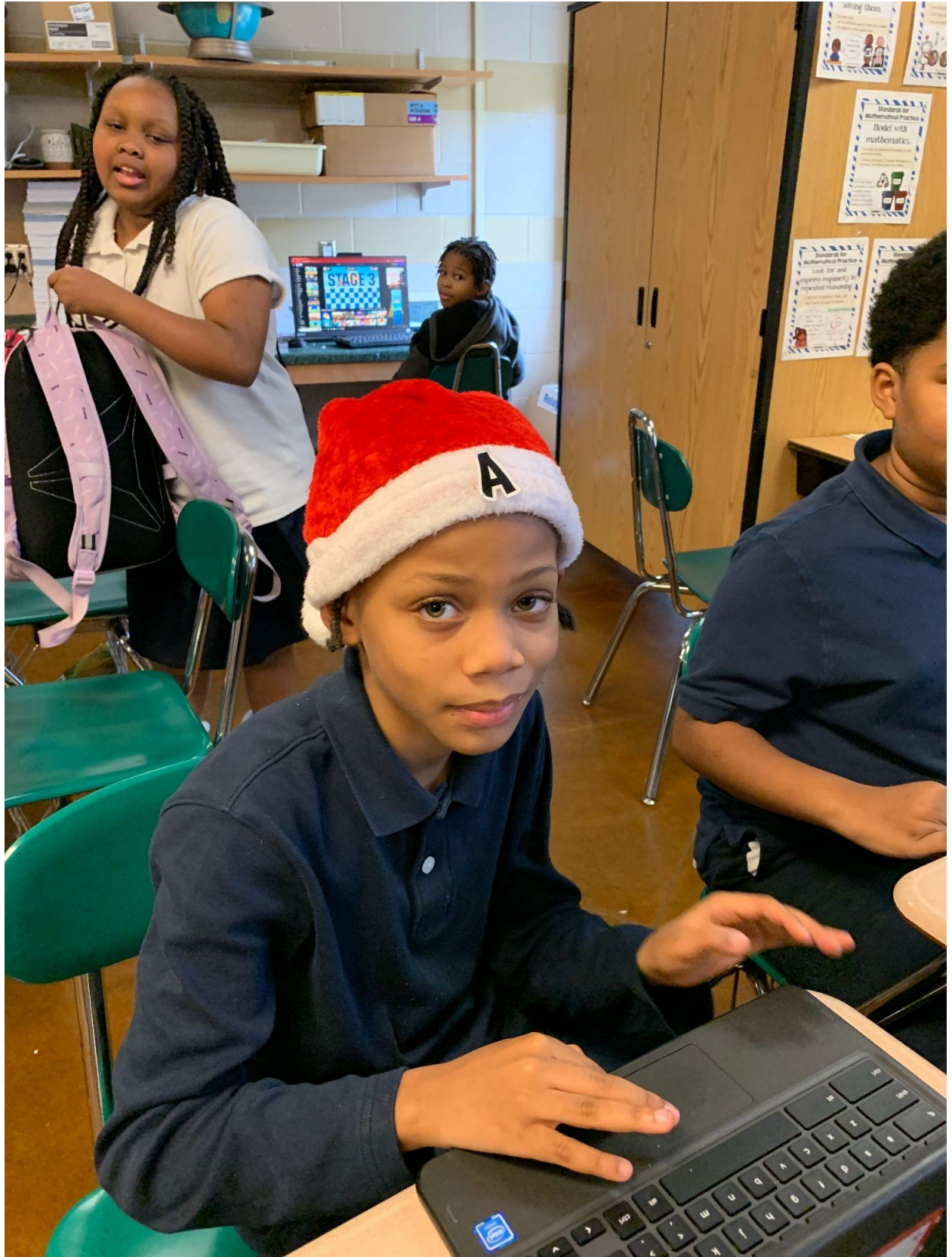


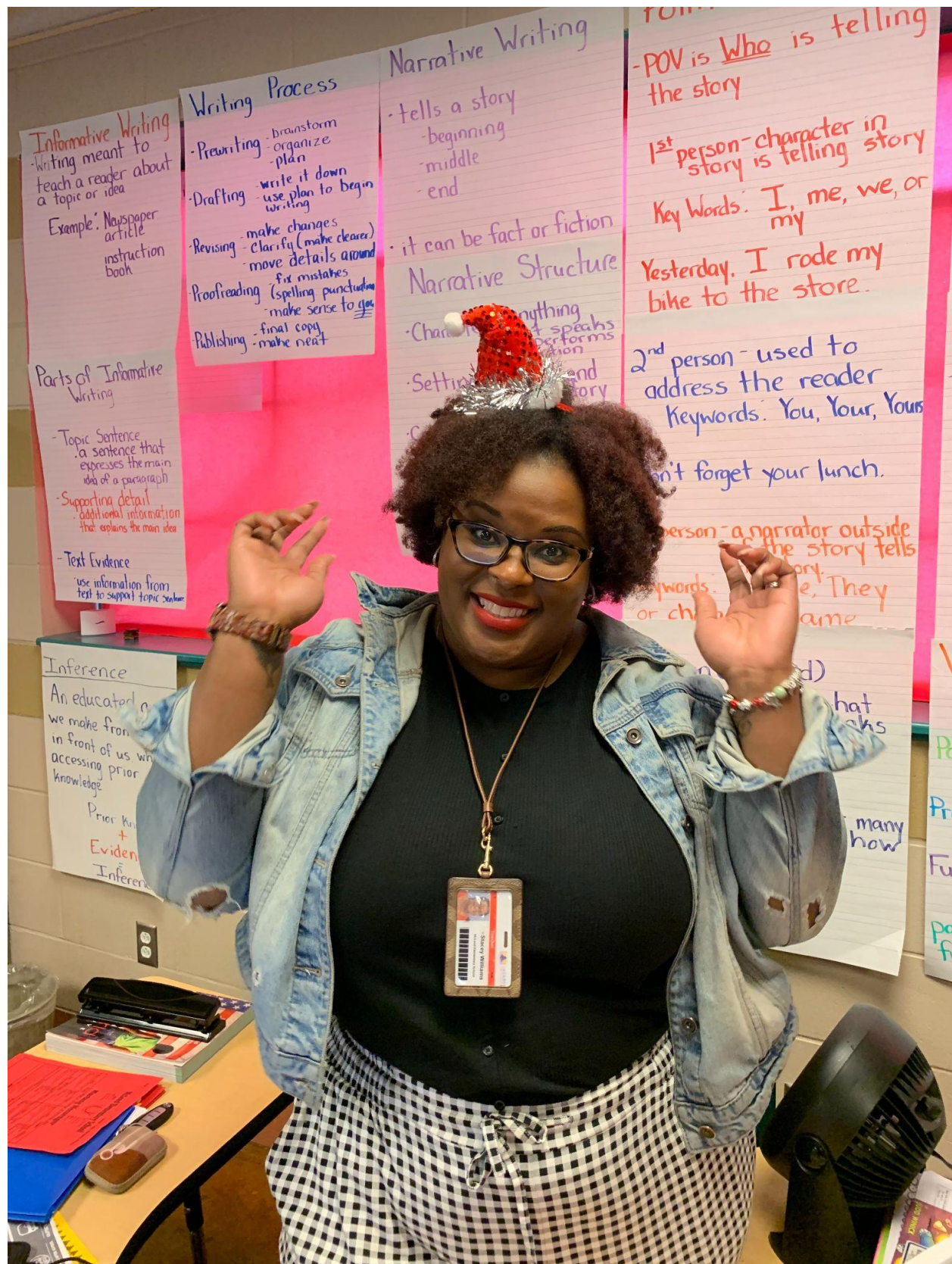












Informative Writing
- Writing meant to teach a reader about a topic or idea
Example: Newspaper article, instruction book

Parts of Informative Writing
- Topic Sentence: a sentence that expresses the main idea of a paragraph
- Supporting detail: additional information that explains the main idea
- Text Evidence: use information from text to support topic sentence

Inference
An educated guess we make from what is in front of us without accessing prior knowledge
Prior knowledge + Evidence = Inference

Writing Process
- Prewriting: brainstorm, organize, plan
- Drafting: write it down, use plan to begin writing
- Revising: make changes, clarify (make clearer), move details around
- Proofreading: fix mistakes, spelling, punctuation, make sense to you
- Publishing: final copy, make neat

Narrative Writing
- tells a story
- beginning, middle, end
- it can be fact or fiction
Narrative Structure
- Characters: anything that speaks or performs an action
- Setting: time and place of the story

POV is Who is telling the story
1st person - character in story is telling story
Key Words: I, me, we, or my
Yesterday, I rode my bike to the store.
2nd person - used to address the reader
Keywords: You, Your, Yours
Don't forget your lunch.
3rd person - a narrator outside of the story tells the story.
Keywords: He, She, They, It, or character's name
