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JPS School Board Members Visits to Schools

Board of Trustees Operations Policy: BBBCB Eva Doss Wingfield High School

Policy Guidelines

- Each school board member appointed to office after July 1, 2002, shall spend one full day each school year, without compensation, in one or more of the District's schools. (MS Code Section 37-7-306) Board members appointed to office before July 1, 2002, shall not be required to meet the requirements of this policy until they are reappointed.
- The Board, at their discretion, may periodically visit schools in the district to determine necessary school improvements. (MS Code Section 37-7-301).



Statutes that Guide this Policy

• This policy is guided by:

2020 Mississippi Code Title 37 - Education Chapter 7 -School Districts; Boards of Trustees of School Districts Article 7 - Boards of Trustees; General Powers and Duties § 37-7-301. General powers and duties

• I found this interesting because while state legislation guides this policy, I could only locate it on the JPS webpage and the Clinton Public Schools webpage. I could not find this policy on Madison County, Rankin County, or Hinds County web pages.



Why this Policy?

- I chose this policy because I wanted to learn more about the requirements for the school board members' visits to schools.
- I also chose this policy so that I could better understand the responsibilities that the Board Members are held up to by the community and how their duties contribute to my own education as well as my peer's education.



Policy Benefits & Disadvantages

According to the policy, "One full day shall mean seven clock hours at one or more of the school district's campuses. Board members may also make multiple visits in hour increments, totaling seven hours."

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Policy Advantages

- Visits provide the Board Members with insight into the academic lessons students are given, which gives Board Members a look into the learning environment.
- Visits conducted by the Board Members also serve as an opportunity to form relationships with Staff, Students, and Faculty to understand issues the schools may face or celebrate successes within the school.
- Lastly, visits to JPS schools conducted by Board Members serve as an open space for constructive criticism to better education and said learning environments.



Policy Disadvantages

While the policy outlined has some positive aspects, such as promoting engagement between school board members and the schools, there are also potential disadvantages.

 Time Constraints: Board members might find it challenging to dedicate a full day or multiple hours to school visits, especially considering their other responsibilities and commitments.

 A total of seven hours may not be enough time to visit schools, especially if a board member has several schools to visit.




What Does Wingfield Think?

- A survey was conducted at my school among students and staff to get their views on the policy.




1. Do you know the purpose of your local school board?






2. Do you know who your board members are?


4. What are things you would like your board members to know about your school? (Academics, School Structure, Athletics.)

Staff Survey Results: 37 Responses


1. Do you know who your board members are?







3. Do you know who your board members are?485 responses






4. Have you seen any board members visit your school? 489 responses











Survey Conclusion

After conducting this survey, it is clear that many students need help understanding the role and function of the school board.

- Many students and staff may not know who board members are because they may not be visiting schools more than their allotted time at their discretion.
- It is excellent that there is a policy that says that school board members should visit the schools; however, visits should occur more often, and more time should be allowed at each school so that students and staff can meet them.
- Schools should invite school board members to programs and activities that are taking place in the school so that they can stay informed on what is taking place in schools (successes and celebrations) and so that students and staff know who they are when they are visiting.



Recommendations To Enhance This Policy

- Recommendation for the State: Allow more time (more than seven hours) for board members to visit schools. It would give more insight to Board Members and the schools in their ward and serve as a way for them to become more familiar with board members and form relationships.
- Define Purpose for Visits: Clearly outline the purpose of board member visits to schools, emphasizing the importance of gaining insights into the educational environment, student experiences, and potential areas for improvement. This ensures that visits are meaningful and contribute to informed decision-making.
- Feedback Mechanism: Implement a feedback mechanism for board members to share their observations and experiences during school visits.
- Public Reporting: Consider making a summary of the board members' school visits available to the public. This promotes transparency and allows the community to understand the board's engagement with the schools.
- Incorporate Evaluation Criteria: Develop criteria to assess the impact of board member visits on decision-making and district improvements. This could include tracking policy changes, resource allocation, or student outcomes following the visits.

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OBJECTIVES

- Provide an overview of the district's graduation rate data for Cohort 2019-20 and graduated in 2022-2023 (Accountability 2023-24)
- Discuss efforts to improve the current graduation and dropout rates for ALL students





How is the graduation rate calculated and used for accountability?

The number of students who **graduate in four (4) years** from a school and LEA with a regular high school diploma or state-defined alternate diploma divided by the number of students who entered four (4) years earlier as first-time 9th graders, with adjustments for deaths, emigration, and transfers in and out. Ninth (9th) grade students who repeat 9th grade will stay in their original cohort.

A **"regular high school diploma"** is the standard high school diploma that is fully aligned with the state's academic content standards. The **Alternate Diploma** meets the requirements for graduation rate in the same manner as a Traditional Diploma.



How is the graduation rate calculated and used for accountability?

• The school/district graduation rate will be multiplied by 2.0 to calculate the points applied to the graduation component of the MS Accountability Model for schools/districts.(1000 PTS)


