Why do we have these plans?

- As required by state law, each school district shall implement an annual dropout prevention plan. The plan must be board approved and posted on the district website homepage by <u>August 1st</u> of each year.
- Each high school with a graduation rate <u>below</u> 85% is required to develop a graduation restructuring plan.
 Representatives from the feeder middle schools should be included in the restructuring planning team. This restructuring plan should be included within the district's dropout plan.

What strategies must be in the District Dropout Plan?

- 1. Reducing the retention rates in grades kindergarten, first and second
- 2. Targeting subgroups that need additional assistance to meet graduation requirements
- Developing dropout recovery initiatives that focus on students age seventeen (17) through twenty-one (21), who dropped out of school
- 4. Addressing how students will transition to the home school district from the juvenile detention centers

1. Reduce the retention rates in grades kindergarten, first, and second.

 JPS I student retention rate will decrease from 12.9% to 10% by May 2022.

 JPS ½ student attendance rate will increase from 77% to 80% by May 2022.



2. Target subgroups that need additional assistance to meet graduation requirements.

- JPS will decrease chronic absenteeism-fiskastudents by 2% by May 2022.
- JPS will increase ELA proficiency-*islatJPS* scholars from 24.7% to 30.0% by May 2022 as evidenced on MAAP.
- JPS will increase Math proficiency effskt JPS scholars from 19.6% to 23.0% by May 2022 as evidenced on MAAP.
- JPS will increase the graduation rate from 78.8% to 79% by May 2022.
- JPS schools must identifyriat students to provide additional support. (JPS targeted subgroups are students with disabilities, EL, Foster Care, Homeless, Pregnant Teens, ovage students, students failed 2 or more grades, underted students)



3. Develop dropout recovery initiatives that focus on students age seventeen (17) through twenty -one (21), who dropped out of school.

- JPS will increase-eetry/re-enrollment of students age 4Z1 that dropped out by 3% (baseline year.)
- JPS will use the Early Warning System indicators to monitor and track students who may potentially dropput of school.
- JPS will decrease the dropout rate by 3.5% per year.
- JPS will use the Early Warning System indicators to monitor and track students who may potentially dropput of school.
- JPS will provide students with an alternate option for the traditional classroom setting.
- JPS will provide additional options for students whoutput attending colleges and universities.



4. Address how students will transition to the home school district from juvenile detention center.

 JPS will follow state policy for transitioning students from the juvenile detention center back to their homehools.



Restructuring Plans

Restructuring plans must be based on the MDE adopted Early Warning System (EWS) that focuses on the ABC indicators of student engagement in school: School Attendance, Behavior, and Course Performance.





Early Warning System

- Attendance -- Students who are chronically absent use a 10% absentee rate to identify – are at risk of dropping out. Based on research, a student is chronically absent if he/she misses 10% or more of a school year (18 days in a 180 day school year.
- Behavior Students who have behavioral issues that are disrupting his/her learning patterns are at-risk of dropping out.
- Course Performance Students who are not performing at a C or better in core classes are at-risk for dropping out.



Restructuring Planning Process

- Team gathered and reviewed EWS data.
- Team identified at least 3 indicators for focused improvement in the coming school year and built an action plan around each indicator.
- The team drafted a dropout prevention/ restructuring plan for the upcoming school year.
 - Describes improvement actions, timelines, resources, measures for success and a monitoring process.
 - Each school has a plan the high school <u>AND EACH</u> feeder middle school(s.)
- The high school and middle school principals will present the action plans today in our school board meeting before board approval.
- Team will discuss the action plans with school staff before school begins this year.


