RAM CITY EDUCATOR SERVING OVERSEAS



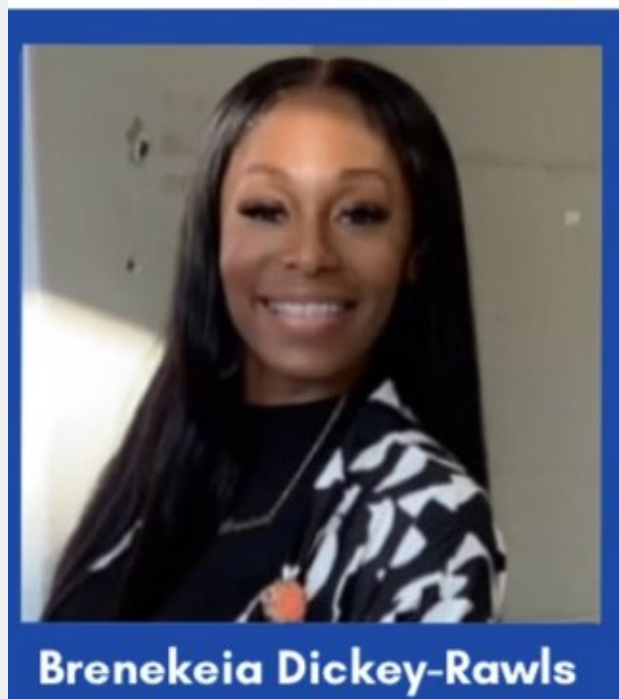
It's no surprise that Provine High educators go above and beyond to help our scholars reach their full potential. However, one Ram City educator has brought that same type of service to another sector. Dr. Alfred Smith, Jr., a veteran Jackson Public Schools educator, is currently on active duty with the U.S. Air Force. He is currently serving a six-month tour at an undisclosed location in Southwest Asia in support of Operation Inherent Resolve.

Dr. Smith is a technical sergeant with the 332d Air Expeditionary Wing Civil Engineer Squadron where his job is an operations manager. He is the non-commissioned officer in charge (NCOIC) for the squadron's customer service/work control shop, where he leads a shop of four airmen, whose primary responsibilities include processing and prioritizing work requests for seven squadron shops, managing base-wide service contracts, and training base personnel to serve as facility managers for their respective buildings.

Dr. Smith is no stranger to serving overseas and, in the U.S., as he is a 29-year military veteran. He completed 24 years of active and reserve duty in the U.S. Navy where he was stationed as a quartermaster onboard the U.S.S. Lake Champlain (CG-57) homeported in San Diego, California. He is currently serving his fifth year in the Air National Guard with the 172d Airlift Wing in Jackson, Miss. as an operations manager with the Civil Engineering Squadron. Next year, he plans to attend Officer Training School to become a 2nd Lieutenant. Over the span of his military career, Dr. Smith has traveled and completed duty tours in Canada, Mexico, Japan, Thailand, Hong Kong, Australia, Dubai, Bahrain, and Jordan, as well as several states in the U.S.

Back at Provine, Dr. Smith serves as chair for the English Department where he teaches Essentials for College Literacy, English IV, Dual Credit Public Speaking, and Journalism. He also serves as lead senior class sponsor and advisor for the Aries Yearbook Staff. Dr. Smith has been teaching for 18 years with ten of those years at Provine. He taught for seven years as a reading teacher at Blackburn Middle School and as an adjunct speech instructor at Hinds Community College. A graduate of JPS and Thee Jackson State University, where he has earned five degrees, Dr. Smith is married to his wife, KasSandra, and they are both the proud parents of their nine-year-old daughter, Karsyn.

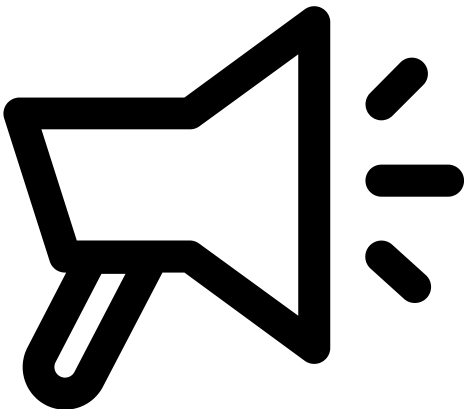

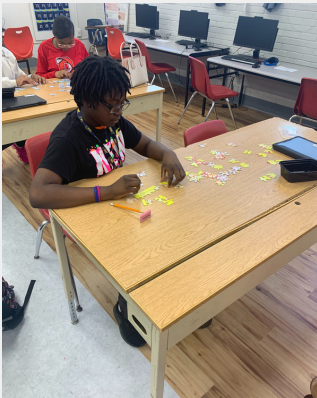
